Craftsman Farms, located in the Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills, is the former home of noted turn-of-the-century designer Gustav Stickley. Built in 1911, the log house is one of the most significant landmarks of the American Arts and Crafts movement, and the site has been designated a National Historic Landmark.
